1. In May 2025, the Gambling Legislation Amendment (Pre-commitment and Carded Play) Bill 2024 was passed in Parliament.

- 2. Following this the Victorian Government announced a trial from May to June 2025 of mandatory pre-commitment systems known as 'carded play' for the local government areas of Monash, Greater Dandenong and Ballarat. These Councils and the broader sector were not consulted.
- 3. Since the initial announcement of the trial, the State Government have removed the mandatory pre-commitment and binding loss limits, the timeframes for the trial, transparency around the evaluation of the proposed trial and the inclusion of other types of technology.
- 4. Optional pre-commitment and cashless play is largely viewed as ineffective in addressing gambling harm.

Related Council decisions

5. The Gambling Harm Minimisation Policy 2016-2021 was adopted at the 9 February 2016 Policy and Services Committee.

Options

- 6. Option 1: Co-sign the Alliance and Monash joint letter to Ministers (Attachment 1) this option strongly aligns with Council's commitment to harm minimisation and advocacy under the Gambling Harm Minimisation Policy and the Nillumbik Health and Wellbeing Plan 2025-2029 in supporting Council's role in promoting community health and safety. This option strengthens partnerships and demonstrates sector leadership. There is low resource requirement for this option and can be prepared within existing officer capacity. The deadline for co-signing has been extended to 20 October 2025.
 - **Option 2:** Send a separate letter to MPs and Ministers outlining Council's position based on our current policies (**Attachment 2**) this option strongly aligns with Council's commitment to harm minimisation and advocacy under the Gambling Harm Minimisation Policy and the Nillumbik Health and Wellbeing Plan 2025-2029 in supporting Council's role in promoting community health and safety. This option further reinforces broad advocacy for safer regulations and equity in wellbeing outcomes and reinforces Council's specific position and alignment with its commitments. There is low resource requirement for this option and can be prepared within existing officer capacity.
 - **Option 3:** Prepare a Council motion reaffirming Council's stance and advocacy role (**Attachment 3**) this option supports adherence to Council's Gambling Harm Minimisation Policy, Nillumbik Health and Wellbeing Plan 2025-2029 and Access Equity and Inclusion Policy. This option is consistent with Council's harm minimisation approach, transparency and community wellbeing commitments. This option reflects Council's role in educating and empowering the community and increases visibility and community awareness. There is moderate resources requirements for this option as officer coordination is required with both the Governance and Communications teams.
 - **Option 4:** Defer advocacy this option partially aligns with Council's harm-minimisation approach but may not reflect a proactive stance in relation to current policy commitments. This option allows alignment with future policy, however, may limit immediate influence. There is no resource requirement for this option.

Re: Victorian EGM trials

The Alliance for Gambling Reform is joined by the undersigned Victorian Councils, spearheaded by the City of Monash in collectively sharing our concerns regarding the mandatory carded play trial announced on 21 July and the progress of the 'Landmark Reforms' announced in July 2023

Local government was generally supportive of the announced reforms to curb the year-on-year record high pokies losses across the state, including carded gambling with mandatory loss limits, noting that these reforms represent a critical step toward reducing gambling harm and restoring agency to individuals affected by it. The Alliance co-ordinated with our Leadership Council partners to provide a submission to the 'Landmark Reforms' consultation in October 2023. You can review that submission here.

As one of the LGA's consistently experiencing the top ten losses, Monash Council publicly welcomed the announced plan that from September to November across all 43 in venues with gaming machines in Monash, as well as the City of Greater Dandenong and the City of Ballarat that:

"People gambling at these venues will need to use a YourPlay card to play electronic gaming machines and set loss limits – helping put the power back into the hands of patrons and prevent money laundering."

At its meeting on 26 August, Monash Council made the decision to withdraw its initial support due to the lack of mandatory and binding loss limits as a feature of the trial.

This came after the June passage of the *Gambling Legislation Amendment (Pre-commitment and Carded Play) Bill 2024* through the Legislative Council where the Minister did not commit to previously stated timelines for a full rollout of the mandatory pre-commitment reforms and introduced that other types of technology including facial recognition technology were now likely to be trialled, therefore the timeline was unknown.

The timeline provided for in the second reading of the Bill by the previous Minister, Melissa Horne, included a pilot for these changes in mid-2025 and mandatory carded play with binding precommitment limits implemented state-wide in late 2027. We understand that the Bill was finalised later than expected, which naturally delayed the initial trial. However, we don't accept that there is no longer a date for when the mandatory pre-commitment will be trialled, along with when mandatory pre-commitment will be rolled out across the state.

Can you please communicate the planned schedule for the statewide rollout?

We are also concerned about the evaluation for the current trial, and any future trials, including a lack of transparency on what is being assessed, by who, whether that assessment will be published in full and when the Minister will respond.

Can you provide us with responses to our questions regarding the evaluation?

Finally, we are concerned that local government has not been recognised as a stakeholder through the trial and through the rollout of the 'Landmark Reforms'. This is despite the ongoing interest of councils in reducing gambling harm in their communities, and their demonstrated willingness to engage realistically with Government on the impacts to their communities.

As the level of government closest to communities, councils are well placed to provide key insights into gambling harm at a local level, as well as identify local opportunities to educate communities on changes that can give them much needed tools to limit harm caused by gambling.

The Alliance was disappointed and surprised that local councils weren't engaged ahead of the trial being finalised, and that even post the announcement, there was no attempt to engage directly with council officers and provide background information.

We believe this lack of engagement has contributed to councils' uncertainty around the trial and its efficacy and are disappointed that no growth area councils (many of which are included in the top 10 losses in the state), were earmarked to participate in the trial.

We urge you to engage directly with councils, including by meeting directly with the Alliance, together with representatives from Monash, Ballarat and Dandenong to discuss the trial and future steps as part of the rollout, and with how councils can be better engaged as a significant stakeholder.

We also hope you will engage directly with the sector on this issue in the coming months by convening an online briefing for all councils and providing greater engagement and supporting collateral so that councils understand the purpose and timelines of future reforms.

We are keen to meet with you as soon as practicable, and we are eager to continue to engage with you regarding the reforms as they progress.

He grew up riding 'the DC trails' in Diamond Creek. The attraction was having an outdoor space where he and his friends could not only ride, but build and reshape the jumps, learning and developing life skills such as collaboration, problem solving and of course riding skills.

This lifestyle contributed to their sense of purpose, achievement, positive relationships and self-worth, qualities that enhance and promote General well-being.

I understand, building unauthorised jumps is a safety issue and causes environmental damage, especially in sensitive riparian zones, and this led to the removal of the 'DC Trails' on 17th Nov 2021.

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


Figure 3 Friday 24/10/2025 4.26am

The plan used for initial consultations and promotion, did not show the full scope of the works (Figure 3). It showed the jumps and the carpark but failed to show the extra family friendly facilities that were required to secure the grant.

At the Council meeting 27th May 2025 it was first announced Challenger St as new site. They said they will engage with community and stake holders on the new location. Full public consultation will be required. They acknowledged that houses overlooked the site.

At the Council meeting 30th Sept

All agreed on a participate Nillumbik survey, detailing the full scope of family friendly facilities, and it was to be rushed through to get work started in the new year. This is the largest project the current council has listed consultation for and they said spending constraints may be required because of the extensive community consultation in 2002 for the Allendale Rd site and they could not build now what they could build in 2022.

On the 3rd of June 2025, NSC published this plan uploading a Website page headed, BMX park rolls into a new location, which stated;

While the process has been complex, it reflects Council's commitment to getting it right for our young people, our environment and our community. Challenger Street Reserve, Diamond Creek has been selected as the new location.

This site meets the requirements for a BMX park, ensuring minimal environmental and cultural impact, is located adjacent to the Diamond Creek Trail and will provide easy access for riders.

Council remains committed to delivering a safe, exciting and inclusive facility for all riders and will contribute \$650,000 to fund the new BMX dirt jumps.

In addition to the new BMX park, the Victorian Government has committed to fund \$2.16 million through the Growing Suburbs Fund (GSF) for a community and recreation park, which will include infrastructure surrounding the BMX dirt jumps.

It's clear that there's a strong local support. This is an exciting project for the Shire because many BMX riders have told us it's something the community really wants.

I have spoken with many locals about the BMX plan in the past 3 weeks, since I became aware of the project. One of them said they attended a meeting in the first consults for the Allendale Rd site proposal. They put their name on a list of people who would like to be part of the consultation process but they were never contacted. When questioning a NSC Recreation and Leisure Officer about this, he said, that intention and desire for this consultation process went nowhere and that group was never established because of the delay in the timeline.

NSC has made no attempt to *get it right* for the environment or our community. They have not conducted and Environmental Effects Statement for this site. Nor did they consult boarder community, beyond BMX riders who only consulted the plan (figure 3)with none of the infrastructure or amenities required to secure the grant (figures 1&2). In accepting this grant, NSC has blown the original concept plan, a BMX track to replace the DC Trails, out of the park (excuse the pun)! When originally consulted, the BMX community was not aware they had to share this space with the wider community such small children and their parents. The Diamond Creek Recreation Park was only conceived because of the grant stipulations.

In two phone conversations 23 & 24th Oct, with NSC Officers, told myself and Officers, that it was an 'oversight' that the extra amenities were not on the plan. It does not appear to be an 'oversight' rather a deliberate tactic to create confusion and receive less objection to the BMX park plan, now way out of the expected timeline.

In those conversations, just 1 & 2 business days from the end of Community consultation period $1-26^{th}$ Oct, I notified the NSC Officers their website still displayed the Plan (figure 3) as the site for the BMX park. They amended this the afternoon on the 24^{th} Oct after informed another Officer.

These screenshots show that on in the morning of 24th Oct the pin linking the BMX park was still on Allendale Rd (figure 4) and shows the plan for the Allendale Rd site without amenities(figure 5).




Figure 7 Thursdday 23 Oct BMX park NSC webpage

Nillumbik Shire Council's webpages throughout the consultation period have been inaccurate, expect for the last 2 ½ days after we let them know about it on 23 and 24 Oct 2025.

Did NSC consult local BMX riders based on the full scope plan in the Growing Suburbs Fund document?

How Does NSC justify the lack of transparency in not using the full scope plan in their published promotions throughout the entire process since 2002?

How can NSC say they've conducted comprehensive community consultation when publishing inaccurate plans on their website throughout the consultation period?

Community Consultation and the Participate Nillumbik Survey

This survey focuses on:

- the surface type for the jumps
- The location of key facilities
- How the surrounding recreation park can best serve the community
- How the community plans to use the site

This survey does not give an option to choose an alternative site.

The questions give tick the box options about infrastructure, jump surface, BBQs, toilets, lighting, and shelters, most with no option to say none. The 5 options for activities include, Community and BMX competition events, impacting local residents, with no option to say none. There are some boxes for comments within and at the end of the survey, which is the only option to say no to anything including the location. The survey allowed 21 days to comment or object. This is their policy however, the local residents, current Reserve users and general community of Nillumbik Shire knew nothing about it.

This is what NSC call community consultation, consulting only one demographic, with no regard for the concerns or needs of other demographics living within the shire. People of all demographics within the shire who already visit Challenger St Reserve for the flora and fauna, passive recreation and open space it provides. Local residents living adjacent to and nearby have no voice for this plan which will directly impact them with visual, noise, dust, and litter pollution if a BMX park was constructed in Challenger St Reserve. None of this is in line with NSC;s Health and Wellbeing Plan, Recreation & Leisure Strategy, Open Space Strategy, Community Sport Fair Access Policy, Environment Charter, Green Wedge Management Plan and even the Council Charter.

I found out about the site change on 03.10.2025 from a neighbour who discovered it from watching the council meeting on 30.07.2025 for a different agenda item. I live adjacent to the entrance and access route in the BMX park plan. To date I have received no communication about the park from NSC, yet I have a received notices for speed humps and tree pruning in local streets.

I did attend an onsite meeting attended by with 5 local residents, NSC representatives, Cn on 10th Oct 2025. Concerned local residents requested this meeting for the Council to hear our concerns. Hot topics included, community consultation, the site change, environmental impacts to fauna and habitat, the size of the park and security. What we did achieve from this meeting was a 5 day extension to comment on or object to the BMX plan. Given there was still no formal communication with local and shire wide residents, 5 days didn't make a lot of difference.

As stipulated in the Growing Suburbs Fund grant, to be commenced March 2024 and completed March 2026. Time and grant money was wasted by NSC on the Allendale Rd site, knowing of the already existing LSIO and Cultural Heritage (ACHS) overlays . this site as it was deemed unsuitable when artefacts were found in the flood zone.

Why did Nillumbik Shire Council put time and money into a plan that had existing LSIO and ACHS overlays?

The DC trails has been rebuilt. This BMX park will not stop this and NSC will still have to deal with it. The people who build and ride there are unlikely to leave their hand built jumps and come out to play with families on ugly uniformed track surfaces.

The proposed BMX park is no longer designed for your target demographic.

These teenagers wanted a space for themselves. If NSC had have been transparent with the plan and really listened to their concerns and not been grant focused, I'm sure a very different plan would have been designed. The original plan for Allendale Rd (figure 3) was more suitable to the demographic it was intended for. If you really want to support the male dominated BMX community.... Give them a shovel!

The size of the park will attract riders Melbourne wide and has potential to host State, National and even International competitions. When I googled big BMX park Melbourne, I found that one of them hasn't been built yet, the Diamond Creek Recreation Precinct (BMX park).

Suddenly our Precious Open Space is subject not just to local youth riding the jumps but patrons coming for weekend, school holiday and competition events creating even more visual, noise, dust and litter pollution. This is totally inappropriate in the middle of a Wetland Reserve.

A BMX park is appropriate for land that is already degraded. An industrial, commercial or other vacant land that does not impinge on a rehabilitated Wetland Reserve rich in wildlife and habitat, in a riparian zone?

Solving a problem impacting one demographic at the expense of the rest of the community does not align with NSC;s Health and Wellbeing Plan, Recreation & Leisure Strategy, Open Space Strategy, Community Sport Fair Access Policy, Environment Charter, Green Wedge Management Plan and the Council Charter.

There are already 2 fully facilitated, family friendly Recreational Precincts just 500 -700 metres away from Challenger St Reserve. The Netball Precinct and the Diamond Creek Regional Play Space. This fantastic family friendly space has all the facilities including the Rotary Tram Café. The Rotary Club supports the Diamond Creek Community, NSC could support The Rotary Club by directing family friendly activities to this facility.

Maintaining 3 separate Recreational facilities within such a short distance will cost NSC and ratepayers. It does not align with your waste management and climate change policies and the values, goals and principles promoted in all the other plans, strategies and guidelines.

I'm sure the rural areas would love the \$650,000 NSC have contributed to this plan for a nearby recreational facility.

I object to the duplication of such facilities within such a small distance of each other. I object to Diamond Creek being the target suburb when we already have several.

How will NSC integrate the maintenance of the new Recreation Precinct and (BMX) Plan in the NSC budget? Why did you not inform or consult local residents when the site Changed?

Environmental Impact

Challenger St Reserve is highly valued for its wildlife and Precious Open Space. Since funding its construction in 2004, Nillumbik Shire Council have shown their commitment with extensive rehabilitation work. It is a Wetlands Reserve part of the riparian corridor and the riparian zone of the Diamond Creek (even if it is not zoned that way on your overlay maps). Wildlife see habitat, not zones.

The local community has supported the rehabilitation participating in NSC events such as National tree Day. In collaboration with the local community, NSC has created valuable habitat for wildlife and is now home to many species including Powerful Owls, Gang-gang Cockatoos and Latham's Snipe, all on Victoria's Threatened Species List.



I have lived here for 8 years and am extremely impressed with the extensive rehabilitation work NSC has done within Challenger St Reserve. They have created an established ecosystem with microclimates suitable for a variety of species of birds and other wildlife. The rehabilitation works follow the tributaries within the reserve, linking and contributing to the health of the Diamond Creek riparian corridor. The Open Space is important for birds of prey as there are mature trees from which to perch whilst hunting.



A comprehensive EES for the Latham's Snipe will need to be completed before approval is given for this site. In 1971 a treaty was signed to protect internationally significant wetlands. Challenger Street is not a Ramsar listed site. However agreements signed between Japan and Australia JAMBA & China and Australia CAMBA apply on certain species migratory bird species. One of which is Latham's snipe.

There are many accounts of Latham's snipe in Challenger St Reserve and being a migratory bird, an EES will need to be conducted during the bird's non breeding season. The threats to this bird include habitat loss caused by residential and commercial development, increase in frequency, scale or severity of fire and cat and fox predation.

Challenger St Reserve is an ecosystem. Birds of prey, cockatoos, swallows, use the hillside for hunting and foraging. A BMX park will impact the area significantly, breaking the links within the reserve and disrupting wildlife and habitat. It will cause erosion, dust, noise, light, and visual pollution. The series of wetlands in Challenger St Reserve provides microclimates and is vital habitat and passage for wildlife.

Fencing off the wetland areas may protect some of the habitat but the wildlife will be impinged as it is vital for animals to move between different areas, which is crucial for biodiversity and genetic health. The BMX plan skirts tightly around the wetlands to the very edge of the 3 heritage, flood (LSIO) and Cultural Heritage Sensitivity overlay zones. The entire Reserve is in a Designated Bushfire Prone Area and has an Environmental Significance Overlay, and. Wildlife don't see zones, they see habitat. It seems that NSC sees empty space not habitat rich Open Space. The construction of a BMX park in the middle of this important

habitat is in conflict with NSC;s Health and Wellbeing Plan, Recreation & Leisure Strategy, Open Space Strategy, Community Sport Fair Access Policy, Environment Charter, Green Wedge Management Plan and the Council Charter.











The Challenger St Reserve community

The people who currently visit Challenger St Reserve cover all demographics within the shire. It is a peaceful Open Space utilised for exercise, socialising, dog walking, picnics, family outings, Park Run, wildlife and bird watching. It is highly valued for its current recreational and environmental qualities and utilised regularly by residents across the shire, many of whom come here daily. You can see in the top middle photo, the path is well worn.

It is public Open Space where residents feel safe. It provides personal space for residents who like to keep to themselves and opportunities for socialising with friends, dogs and meet other locals.

In the 8 years I have lived here I have made acquaintance and friends with many local residents who visit Challenger St Reserve. This community of residents care for and support one another, which has become obvious talking with them about this BMX plan. I value the Challenger St Reserve community and I know that the wellbeing of many of us will be impacted severely.

During the Covid Pandemic it was an important environment for outdoor socialising and mental health for residents who visit the Reserve.

Before choosing Challenger St Reserve did you consider or consult local residents and the broader community about the impact this BMX plan will have on them?

Have you considered the health and wellbeing of the multiple people currently using Challenger St Reserve for passive recreation in Precious Open Space?

How does NSC justify the contradictions this plan has with the NSC;s Health and Wellbeing Plan, Recreation & Leisure Strategy, Open Space Strategy, Community Sport Fair Access Policy, Environment Charter, Green Wedge Management Plan and the Council Charter.

Have you considered this is one of few off leash areas and is utilised regularly for this purpose?

Fire Management

Challenger St Reserve is in a Designated Bushfire Prone Area.

The proposed BMX plan is in conflict with the Nillumbik Municipal Fire Management Plan. It contradicts, the Vision for 'a safer and more resilient community', the Purpose, 'reduce risks to the community' and the Principles, particularly 'Community focus', the core values and strategies of this plan.

Diamond Creek CFA uses the proposed access route every Tuesday and Sunday to train volunteers. They practice around wetlands and up the hilly western side, and down to the eastern wetland area where they train volunteers to fill their tanks using the 'billabong', the water body to the east of the BMX plan to train volunteers in filling up their tanks in the case of emergencies.

There is no access on the south side of the billabong as it is planted out with State Government Freeway Trees. To the north, more Freeway Trees, with enough space for a CFA truck to get through. The BMX plan blocks this access on the North side and therefore will be no access for the CFA to water to fill their tanks within the Reserve in case of an emergency.

The CFA is called out regularly for fires on the east side of the park. Some of these fires are lit by the people who use the unauthorised jump park. Redirecting these people into the Reserve increases the likely event of fire within the reserve.

I addressed this in a FB comment on one of Peter Perkin's post to Diamond Creek Community Voice No Business Advertising group on 6^{th} Oct 2025

He did not reply but coincidently, the following Sunday 12.Oct, the CFA used the access gate adjacent to the Men's Shed for training in the northern area of the Reserve floodplain. The tank filling exercise was conducted via the walking trail on the side east of the billabong. A member of the CFA I spoke with said it is NSC who directs where training is allowed and conducted. Myself and other residents have never seen the CFA train on the east side of the Reserve.

This plan puts the safety of local residents and patrons to the BMX park at risk. Challenger St Reserve acts as a fire break. The area along the east side of the park is heavily vegetated. It is extremely important that the CFA has full, uninhibited access to the Reserve to protect residents and dwellings adjoining and close to the Reserve.

The BMX Park plan breaches the Nillumbik Municipal Fire Management Plan.

How will NSC manage the reduced safety and increased risk to residents and patrons in the event of a fire emergency?

How does NSC justify the contradictions and conflicts this plan has with the Nillumbik Municipal Fire Management Plan?

Permits & Obligations to Interested Parties

Melbourne Water

Melbourne Water has not received a planning permit for Challenger St Reserve. The Build Over Consent applications are not available to the public.

Council agenda paper commenting on the Allendale Rd site from Tuesday 27th October 3rd June: Further, and ultimately, Melbourne Water did not approve because of the significant earthworks and importation of fill following the CHMP

Has NSC received Build Over Consent from Melbourne Water?

Traffic and Parking

The planned access into the Reserve is via small residential streets.

Watkins, Moray, Campbell Streets have speed bumps to manage the traffic. These streets plus Challenger St are already congested at times with the Men's Shed, Netball, Baseball, Tennis, Scouts and residents who walk in the reserve.

I am aware you intend to upgrade the Men's Shed car park but there is no room for extension as it is surrounded by flood zone and planning is restricted with an LSIO.

How does NSC intend to manage the increased traffic in these streets? How will NSC manage traffic in an emergency situation particularly bushfire?

Access Route and Heritage tree

The access into the reserve is in conflict with the Heritage Overlay on the Sugar Gum tree at the entrance to Challenger St Reserve. The impact of a carpark construction and increased traffic from patrons and construction vehicles will compromise the trees' health.

This tree is important habitat site for many birds including Powerful Owls and Gang-gang Cockatoos. It has many hollows for breeding and is a very busy forage tree. I regularly see Gang-gang Cockatoos frolicking in that tree. I regularly hear Powerful Owls calling to each other within the reserve and in this tree.

It is also adjacent to my boundary and is just $3.65-5\,$ metres away from the wall of my house. This will impact me greatly with dust, noise, and traffic pollution and will significantly affect the quality of life and mental health for those of us who live there.



Increasing traffic in a Designated Bushfire Prone Area will put local residents and patrons of the BMX park at risk in an emergency in a bushfire?

This access is currently only used by resident, Government and emergency vehicles.

How will you manage the Heritage listed Sugar Gum tree?

How does NSC justify expanding a carpark and directing public traffic over the root Zone of the Heritage Tree?

Police

I contacted Diamond Creek Police on 24th Oct. They are aware of and concerned about the BMX Park plan. The concerns we discussed and share are:

- drug use within the BMX park and the surrounding Reserve, used by residents of all demographics including children
- damage to the wetlands and nearby rehabilitation works from motorbikes and drug users
- increased motorbike and moped use within the park
- increase in police call outs for unlawful and disruptive behaviour
- increase in police call outs for emergencies such accidents, snake bites and fires within the reserve

Increased motor bike and moped use within the Reserve is already of great concern to police and residents. These vehicles are really loud and tear through the park regularly causing noise and environmental pollution

and degradation. Can you imagine how happy they'll be to have jumps? Police regularly attend call outs due to motorbike and moped use within the Reserve. By the time they get there, the motorised bikes are long gone.

Additional concerns I have which are police matters that I have not yet discussed with them include:

- the potential increase in vandalism to the Reserve and adjacent properties caused by people living in
 and away from the shire who don't respect the Reserve's nearby residents, wetlands and wildlife.
- the personal safety of local residents using the park both in daytime and nighttime hours?

How will NSC manage these concerns shared by police and local residents alike and the additional concerns I have mentioned?

How does NSC justify creating a facility which has real and concerning potential to increase police call outs.

In Summary, it is Nillumbik Shire Council and elected Councillors' responsibility to adhere to the Vision, Principles and Goals within NSC's Strategies, Management Plans and Guidelines.

As I ratepayer and resident I expect this and hold you accountable to them.

As these conflicts highlight that Challenger St Reserve is the wrong location, can we find a more suitable location for the Diamond Creek Recreation Precinct (BMX park)?

- Environment, biodiversity, plants and animals the importance of the natural environment for plants and animals as well as humans
- Community
- Recreation and leisure activities
- Lifestyle
- Rural living.

What people thought the opportunities were:

- Utilising the green wedge for health and wellbeing services and industries and the opportunities provided by the environment to improve human health and wellbeing.
- Improving infrastructure to encourage people to visit the green wedge and to assist the local community in day-to-day activities.
- Community building to leverage the community strengths and work with existing groups to develop a shared understanding of living in the green wedge.
- Sustainable tourism opportunities to encourage people into the green wedge and local towns.
- Environmental protection to protect the green wedge for future generations.

And what people thought the challenges might be:

- Concerns that the population will be increased and the area over developed.
- Transport issues, particularly poor quality and congested roads and lack of good public transport, safe cycling and horseriding options.
- The risk of bushfires and the need to manage land to reduce its impacts.
- Avoiding a reduction in the quality of the land through poor management, development or neglect.
- Costs for individuals living in the green wedge and the importance of finding funding options from other levels of government, to reduce the financial pressure on local residents of maintaining the green wedge.
- Finding the balance between people and the environment and between different groups, such as farmers, conservationists and recreational users.
- Difficult, costly, time-intensive and unfair planning processes were considered a challenge by some respondents.

Bushland & Wetland Reserves Prioritisation & Planning Guidelines

Challenger St Reserve is listed as one of 8 reserves of note, prioritised in the top 25% of the 99 reserves within the Shire and is highlighted to Conserve and Enhance.

(Nillumbik reserves CSTR 19.49 ha Asset Id 91976 score 43 Conserve & Enhance)

Integrated Water Management Strategy

Integrated Water Management (IWM) recognises projects which deliver multiple benefits such as; water security, protection of receiving waters, ecosystem services, social/political engagement, microclimate benefits, improved liveability and community well-being.

Open Space Strategy

The Open Space Strategy's primary focus is on open space used for passive recreation and conservation purposes rather than organised sports.

The following terms define the use of open space:

- Passive Recreation includes non-organised land uses including informal play, walking, sitting, bird watching etc.
- Organised Sport generally includes land used for organised events such as football, cricket, soccer, swimming or equestrian uses.
- Conservation reserves where there is an identified conservation function such as habitat areas, wetlands, waterways and land with remnant vegetation.
- Connectivity- land identified with a connectivity function (provides habitat) generally including shared pathways and linear links. (Power line easements may be included.)
- Heritage- reserves with identified heritage features.

Need for Open Space

Population characteristics and trends show that there is a need to cater for a range of open space types including active and passive facilities. While the Shire will experience only modest growth, there is a high expectation that this growth will occur in the established areas .

Community surveys indicate that walking, bike riding and dog walking were the main leisure activities residents participated in. Other concerns were accessibility and distance to open space.

The open space network, especially along waterways, plays a key role in protecting rare and threatened flora, fauna and vegetation communities.

Strategic Directions for the Open Space Network

Vision

- Nillumbik will provide a diversity of open space with a range of high quality regional, district and neighbourhood parks linked by a network of trails.
- Nillumbik's open space network will be easily accessible and provide all residents and visitors with a range of passive and active recreation opportunities.
- Nillumbik will ensure its open space is developed and managed on a sustainable basis to meet the needs of the community and protect environmental values for present and future generations.

The Open Space Vision will be supported by five Guiding Principles.

The Guiding Principles establish a framework for how decisions will be made in relation to public open space. They are as follows:

Diversity

Maintain and enhance the open space network to cater for the community's wide range of recreation and leisure activities.

Quality

Ensure the open space network is of a high quality that caters for local residents and visitors to the Shire. Access

Ensure open space is equitably distributed across the Shire and linked through a comprehensive network of trails.

Sustainability

Protect areas of significant environmental value including remnant vegetation, habitat, waterways, cultural heritage and areas of landscape significance.

Partnerships

Work in partnership with government agencies and the local community in the planning and management of open space, trails and recreation facilities.

Nillumbik Health and Wellbeing Plan

The Nillumbik Health and Wellbeing Plan 2021-2025 outlines our commitment to address health and wellbeing priorities and reduce inequalities over the next four years.

Our priorities for the next four years are:

- Social inclusion and connection
- Community and climate resilience
- Gender equality and prevention of family violence
- Physical activity
- Food
- Reducing harm from alcohol, other drugs and gambling.

We are committed to regularly sharing outcomes and progress with the community. The delivery and evaluation of this plan will be supported through Annual Implementation Plans and Annual Progress Reports which will be developed in collaboration with the Health and Wellbeing Advisory Committee and made available on Council's website.

Dear Nillumbik Shire

I am writing in objection to Challenger St Reserve as the site for The Diamond Creek Recreation Precinct (BMX Park). Great Idea Wrong Location.

Upon moving to the area I have been amazed by the amount of work that has gone into Challenger Street Reserve. Nillumbik shire spent \$180,000 to create a wetlands reserve and have continued with rehabilitation via Acacia Environmental Management and volunteers on community planting days.

I grew up in country Victoria and developed a love for our forests. As a young adult I became a Diploma qualified Arborist. I worked in State and National forests as a seed collector to help replant forest areas after natural disasters and logging. When I moved to Melbourne I was drawn to Nillumbik Shire due to its green nature and values.

Recently I found out about the BMX Jump Park. I've spoken to people I've met around Diamond Creek and in Challenger St Reserve. I found out about the illegal jumps, went to see them and was amazed by what has been happening beside the creek for 30 plus years. So YES the idea to create a BMX Park to reduce this from happening is a good idea.

They dig, build and then ride what they have created. In Alexandra about 10 years ago, the council solved this problem by dumping big loads of soil in an already degraded space, and the kids were then allowed to build their own jumps. This was so successful it continues to grow with council support to this day.

Designing them a \$2.81 million family friendly Recreation BMX Jump Park doesn't make sense. Who are we trying to make this park for? It's not for the people who it was intended for. The councillors told me it had to be used in Diamond Creek and has to be a family friendly space with facilities. Not really the place I expect to see the people creating the illegal jumps to be hanging out. Who are we planning to build these jumps for?

I decided to contact all the elected Councillors to ask questions and share my opinion on the plan. I spoke with 6 of the 7 (one didn't respond), and was mostly met with hostility. It was clear 3 had already made their decision and 3 said they were waiting for more information before making a decision.

One councillor Gave me the Council's official statement,

"We are in community consultation at the moment."

Then he gave me his personal statement,

"It's here or we give the money back, and we are not giving the money back".

Quite a Statement, especially as due process has not yet occurred! Community consultation was not conducted for this site and is currently not on the table.

One councillor said a comprehensive environmental survey is being conducted. Environmental studies had not been conducted before this site was chosen and this plan has not even reached the desk of the your own Environment Department.

Why have an Environment Department with specialised Officers if you don't seek their council on building a large Recreational Facility in the middle of a Wetland Reserve? These Officers are employed because of their specific environmental knowledge, including the biodiversity and requirements of wetlands. They know the country because they spend time observing, planning, maintaining and rehabilitating the reserve. Some of them said they visit for their own enjoyment.

Who is conducting the comprehensive environmental survey? Is the survey being rushed through like the BMX jump survey?

The council wasted time on Allendale Rd site knowing there were LSIO and Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Overlays on the site. I was also told this is the only place available to put the BMX Jump Park, that is not in the LSIO. A jump park is not appropriate in the middle of a Wetland Reserve regardless of the LSIO because it is vital habitat for wildlife. It is also a beautiful place, used by many people of all ages for peaceful recreation.

Another concern I have is Heritage Sugar Gum tree at the entrance to the Reserve. Already 2/3 of the root system are compromised due to soil compaction from car parking and heavy vehicles. Why have NSC not protected these trees with bollards to stop parking around the tree? This is standard practice.

Increasing traffic on the remaining 1/3 is not a recommended for the longevity of the tree. You can't upgrade the car park, because the tree protection zone is 24 metres for this size tree. Digging the area will damage the roots of the tree under the car park.

Green Wedge Council only when it comes to you, not them?

The BMX Jump Park is on the left of the driveway, on the right there are two old red gum trees, both on the historic tree register, no bollards or protection for them either.

One has an active split in the stem caused through mismanagement of the tree. If left unattended it will fail and be catastrophic for the trees future.

The Nillumbik Council Plan, How can this be met, when council shows know integrity with their intentions and communication, when they fail to consult the community and when they make decisions on projects without all the information being presented to them?

As a new community member (that hasn't changed Facebook details) I was shocked by one councillor's comments on Social Media. Instead of helpful, informative comments, they were belittling, deflective and sometimes rude. They were mostly directed at concerned residents and greater community that wanted questions answered because they hadn't been informed.


If the funding goes back to the Victorian Government the council and councillors have said it would affect future grants. Does that mean we have to get a Recreation Precinct (BMX park), with (BMX park) now in brackets? Family facilities are less than a km away at the Tram Café, Baseball field and Netball courts.

The council are less concerned about the intended demographic, and now intend to ruin a beautiful Wetlands Reserve which is currently used by all demographics from across the Shire, just because the council don't want red faces?

Council needs to read and adhere to their own Vision, Principles, Values, Goals and commitments in their Council Plan, Environmental Charter, Green Wedge Management Plan, Open Space Strategy, Climate Action Plan, Health and Wellbeing Plan, Reserves Prioritisation and Planning Guidelines in which they clearly state they are transparent and fair and care for community and the environment.

We need more time to get this right. Find a location that is not near the creek and wetlands. Great idea to have a BMX Jump Park, but wrong location.

Thank you for taking the time to meet this morning to discuss our concerns regarding the proposed location for the BMX park. We appreciated your patience listening to our queries and frustrations as well as the perspective you were able to provide regarding the BMX park proposal. Understanding that the consultation process for this project is now commencing, as per your suggestion I have included some of the concerns I compiled within the council survey I responded to earlier this week, and included all 7 councillors on the distribution list.

As we discussed, I have been a Nillumbik resident for over 20 years and my house is on the fenceline overlooking the proposed location for the park, therefore I am directly impacted if this project proceeds as is planned. I am not opposed to the concept of this project, but my concerns and objections relate to the proposed location, the process that has been followed to this point, and also the increased risk to safety and security of impacted residents. In summary, these concerns include:

- There has been an absence of community consultation regarding the recent revisions of this project.
- The proposed location is unsuitable as it is simply too close to residential housing.
- The proposed design is simply too large and appears significantly larger than my understanding of the original proposal for the Allendale Road site
- The project will directly impact the safety and security of local residents as well as negatively affecting the quiet enjoyment of their property.
- To this point, no information has been supplied to impacted residents. Many
 residents have either heard of this project by word of mouth or remain completely
 unaware that this project has been proposed.
- There has been no information released as to why this project is an effective use of rate payers' money, and there is no apparent detail to the broader community of the construction and ongoing run/maintain costs related to this project.
- There is no information available that states why the Challenger reserve location
 has been selected when there are seemingly multiple superior locations that would
 not impact residents, including the original Allendale Rd location, Elizabeth Street
 or the vacant space beside the Tram café playground.

Therefore, I request that Nillumbik council engage in community consultation and share the reasoning and considerations that support the selection of the Challenger Reserve location for this

project. The purpose of this consultation should be to inform and seek feedback from impacted residents prior to confirmation of this project, on topics that include:

- How the safety of residents and their properties will be assured
- The number of daily visitors expected to this facility, both local and non-Nillumbik residents
- Recommendations on the additional security measures that should be taken by the nearby residents whose properties (back fences) will be exposed to an increased number of visitors.
- How this project aligns with the regulations governing the protection of the wetlands area.
- How noise levels will be monitored and controlled.
- How the potential issue of loitering youths will be managed.
- The general level of police surveillance that will be provided.
- The hours the track will be in operation, including lighting for the area.
- How will the safety of riders will be assured/monitored, including how injuries will be managed
- Whether security cameras will be established and what will these cameras be monitoring
- What additional traffic access will need to be established (ie how will ambulances access the track when a rider inevitably has a crash requiring medical attention)
- How many car parking spaces are planned to enable access at the expense of additional wetlands
- What upgrades to local roads/intersections have been considered, noting the danger presented by the Challenger Street, Ryans Road intersection
- How impacts to local fauna will be managed (ie Powerful Owl, wombats, echidnas, kangaroos etc)

Although awareness of this project across local residents is still limited, the points listed above are reflective of many of the concerns shared by those that I have spoken with.

I hope today's discussion prompts reconsideration of the alternate locations, and look forward to the further consultation that explains how these concerns can be mitigated.

I'm writing with deep concern regarding the recent decision to locate the proposed BMX Jumps and Recreation Park at Challenger Street Reserve.

As a local resident and mother of three young children, I fully support creating spaces for young people to ride and connect, but this particular location is completely unsuitable. The scale of the proposed park is far too large and far too close to nearby homes, and it would take up a significant portion of a much-loved community reserve.

Challenger Street Reserve is a peaceful green space, home to native birds, wetlands, and wildlife, and is used daily by walkers, runners, cyclists, dog owners, horse riders, and families. It also sits between two major parks already, so converting this smaller, quieter reserve into an intensive BMX facility will remove valuable open space for all residents.

What has left many of us most disappointed is the lack of consultation around the recent change of location. Local residents and regular users of the reserve were not notified or engaged before the decision was endorsed. That is not genuine community consultation or transparent planning.

If other potential sites across the shire have been explored and found unsuitable, then perhaps this project simply isn't one that can be delivered appropriately within this community.

Forcing it into a sensitive residential and environmental area is not the answer.

In just a few hours of discussion among neighbours, another community member started a petition opposing the location signed by over 200 residents. This response reflects the deep concern and frustration many locals are feeling.

I urge Council to pause this project immediately, conduct genuine consultation with residents, and work collaboratively to find an alternative approach that aligns with the Green Wedge principles and preserves the natural and social character of our neighbourhood.

Please, reconsider this decision before irreversible damage is done. Challenger Street Reserve is a treasured part of our community, let's keep it that way.

I request that it be included in the formal community consultation for the BMX Park.

I am writing to express my concerns about the proposed location for the new BMX track. While I am not opposed to the idea of a BMX facility and acknowledge the value it can bring to the community, I am deeply concerned about the site that has been selected for its development.

The location in question occupies an area of open space that is not only visually beautiful but also environmentally sensitive. The construction of the track—along with associated infrastructure such as an access road, car park, and toilet facilities—would result in significant disruption to the natural landscape and the habitats it supports. This space is currently valued by many residents as a place of tranquillity and informal recreation, and its loss would be felt widely within the community.

A group of 3 friends made the trip to overport bike park in Frankston recently (a facility built by the trail collective.) and two of us chose not to ride as the SIC surface was too dangerous to fall on due to how abrasive it was. While we were there a young girl fell and the surface shredded her leg quite bad. I recently had a look at the BMX race track in Mill Park where the entire facility is a mix of asphalt and SIC surface. The SIC surface there was much smoother and much less abrasive and was more akin to an asphalt then the surface in overport. I strongly believe the best compromise in terms of safety and maintenance especially for the bigger jumps in the park is to have the take-off ramps coated in SIC surface while the landing ramps be left as dirt. Reasons being is generally the take-off ramps require the most maintenance, while the landing ramps have the most crashes. I also believe the pump track needs a redesign. To many pumptracks are built without much thought. A good pumptrack especially at this size needs to be one track in one direction. As it will mainly be used by junior riders A bi directional double track causes a lot conflict and safety issues of kids crashing into each other. Also alot of pump tracks are made too narrow and a bit bland. Google pump tracks, they are the most boring things visually. The scale of the proposed park is far too large and far too close to nearby homes, and it would take up a significant portion of a much-loved community reserve. Challenger Street Reserve is a peaceful green space, home to native birds, wetlands, and wildlife, and is used daily by walkers, runners, cyclists, dog owners, horse riders, and families. It also sits between two major parks already, so converting this smaller, quieter reserve into an intensive BMX facility will remove valuable open space for all residents. What has left many of us most disappointed is the lack of consultation around the recent change of location. Local residents and regular users of the reserve were not notified or engaged before the decision was endorsed. That is not genuine community consultation or transparent planning. If other potential sites across the shire have been explored and found unsuitable, then perhaps this project simply isn't one that can be delivered appropriately within this community. Forcing it into a sensitive residential and environmental area is not the answer. I urge Council to pause this project immediately, conduct genuine consultation with residents, and work collaboratively to find an alternative approach that aligns with the Green Wedge principles and preserves the natural and social character of our neighbourhood. Please, reconsider this decision before irreversible damage is done. Challenger Street Reserve is a treasured part of our community, keep it that way.

Updated definitions	Revised and expanded definitions to reflect current engagement practices and terminology.

This update aims to support consistent, effective engagement that gives our community a voice in shaping Council decisions.

Community feedback was used to inform the policy on how Nillumbik Shire Council will engage with our community going forward.

Through the feedback received by our community members and staff we identified some core engagement objectives.

Insights gathered during this next phase of engagement will guide any final refinements to the document.

Transparent	Effective two-way communication with clear and relevant information
Time	Fair and reasonable opportunity for community to give input
Keep it simple	Easy to understand language and less jargon
Opportunity	Multiple options to participate in the engagement processes

What is community engagement?

Community engagement is the process of involving the public in decisions that affect them. It is critical to the successful development and implementation of Council strategic planning and decisions, and for improving services by being responsive to the needs of the community.

Community engagement is:

- a two-way process of interaction between Council and the community; and
- about matters such as a decision Council needs to make, or a problem or issue affecting the community that Council wishes to address or an issue that the community wants council to address

Purpose of this policy

This Community Engagement Policy is a formal expression of Council's commitment to engaging the Nillumbik community in planning and decision-making through the use of appropriate, effective and inclusive practices.

This policy:

- articulates Council's commitment to engaging effectively with its community in a meaningful, accountable, responsive and equitable way.
- outlines how Council will ensure that community engagement is integrated into Council activities to support decision making, build relationships and strengthen the Nillumbik communities sense of identity
- should be applied at the planning stage of any project or initiative, when a change in service, activities or infrastructure is considered and again prior to when a decision is made.
- when a change in government policy or legislation impacts Council services/business
- seeks to improve Council's engagement processes and outcomes through encouraging a consistent and transparent approach and continual learning through evaluation, and through expanding the range of engagement methods used
- applies to Councillors, staff, contractors and volunteers. It also serves as a guide to external organisations delivering infrastructure and services in Nillumbik.
- outlines the key role of the community in Council's planning and decisionmaking.

Our commitment to community engagement

Nillumbik Shire Council is committed to providing good governance and the delivery of high quality local services by enabling meaningful engagement with the community.

It will achieve its commitment to inclusive and effective community engagement by adherence to this Community Engagement Policy to guide efforts to enhance the planning and delivery of Council's services and programs.

Community engagement does not necessarily mean achieving consensus. However, it does involve seeking broad, informed input into the decision-making process to achieve the best possible outcomes.

Community engagement core values

The International Association of Public Participation (IAP2) specify a series of core values that should be used to underpin community engagement. Nillumbik's Community Engagement Policy builds on these core values.

- 1. Public participation is based on the belief that those who are affected by a decision have a right to be involved in the decision-making process.
- 2. Public participation includes the promise that the public's contribution will influence the decision.
- Public participation promotes sustainable decisions by recognising and communicating the needs and interests of all participants, including decision makers.
- 4. Public participation seeks out and facilitates the involvement of those potentially affected by or interested in a decision.
- 5. Public participation seeks input from participants in designing how they participate.
- 6. Public participation provides participants with the information they need to participate in a meaningful way.
- 7. Public participation communicates to participants how their input affected the decision.

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
We will also look to introduce new and innovative ways to communicate to ensure our engagement achieves the necessary reach and level of information.

- Supplying information in plain language and translated and accessible formats and summary documents where this is appropriate.
- Using a range of communication channels and accessible formats.
- Making information about our projects available on our Participate Nillumbik digital engagement platform or provided in other formats as required.



Community engagement principles

The following principles will guide Council's approach to community engagement.

	promote opportunities and provide reasonable support to enable a wide cross section of the people and groups affected by the matter that is the subject of community engagement to actively participate in decision-making.
	consideration will be given to the types of engagement activities being planned to ensure they are inclusive and maximise the potential for participation

When we engage

Council is committed to being inclusive and transparent in its decision-making. Council will engage on matters that affect our community and where it believes that community engagement will result in a better outcome for the community and better informed decisions.

Council's engagement will commence as early as possible in the process. This helps to ensure our community and stakeholders can make a meaningful contribution that can help direct Council outcomes and decision making. Engagement may occur once or multiple times, commensurate with the scope, complexity and impact of the project or decision. Opportunities to give feedback and input will be made available for 3-4 weeks.

The following are examples of the occasions when community engagement would be undertaken:

- · Major strategic planning
- · Land use planning
- Service levels/standards
- The design of new infrastructure or facilities and renewal of existing infrastructure
- Specific projects or programs (such as sport and recreation, community safety, tourism)
- Legislative, policy or service issues that are the responsibility of higher levels
 of government, but where the Council wishes to convey community views

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(such as issues impacting the Green Wedge, housing, education, the environment and health)

• Where the *Local Government Act 2020* or other legislation prescribes that community consultation is required.

There may be reasons or times when engagement will not be possible, these may include :

- an immediate resolution is required, such as in an emergency
- · a risk to public safety
- · technical or other expertise is required
- · an initiative involves confidential or commercial information
- clear and defined legislative responsibilities must be met
- developing or reviewing internal policies and procedures
- timeframes and methodology have been predetermined by other levels of government

Who we engage

Council values the input of all members of our community so it is important that our engagement methods are accessible and broad reaching.

For each engagement we will identify the communities or stakeholders who are impacted and seek to engage with them to ensure we have representative feedback to guide our project or decision making

The community includes but is not limited to:

- traditional owners of land in Nillumbik
- people who live, work, participate in leisure activities, visit, study, invest in, or pass through Nillumbik.
- people and bodies who are ratepayers of the Council.
- Nillumbik Council Staff
- people and bodies who conduct activities in Nillumbik. This may include, but is not limited to: community groups, not-for-profit organisations, businesses, State and Federal governments, other local governments and service providers.

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Inclusive engagement

We recognise that good community engagement involves providing the right opportunities, at the right time and in the right way for people to have a say on issues that are important to and/or affect them.

Barriers to engagement

People may face barriers to participating in community engagement for a range of reasons. These barriers depend on the different circumstances of the individual and how these have been shaped by long-standing systems and social conditions that impact participation.

There are different groups in different communities who may find it more difficult to participate in engagement activities.

Some of the groups often considered as harder to reach due to their respective barriers to engagement are:

- o Homeless people
- o Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people
- o People with a disability
- Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD)
- o Established migrant communities
- New migrant communities
- The bereaved or traumatised
- o People with health issues
- Residents in public housing
- o Parents and carers
- New residents
- Hearing, speech or vision impaired people
- o People living in rural or regional areas
- International students
- Professionals and business owners
- o Lesbian, gay, bi, trans, intersex and queer (LGBTIQA+) people
- Young people
- o Older people
- o Children

These groups may not engage through traditional methods due to barriers like access, trust, time, or language so the approach must be tailored, respectful, and inclusive.

When designing and implementing engagement approaches, we are committed to addressing barriers and ensuring the voices of those who may be harder to reach are included.

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How we engage

In planning for community engagement, Nillumbik Council will ensure that appropriate tools and methods are applied, taking into account the scope and objectives of the engagement project, the significance and complexity of the matter, the level of resourcing required and the level of impact on the community.

The key drivers of community participation are:

- Having a clear understanding of the scopes and potential impact of a decision
- The level of influence that the community can have on a decision
- An understanding of the outcomes made possible through participation

Council will align with 'engagement elements' specified by the Victoria Auditor General Office, which councils may be audited on.

Council will apply deliberative engagement practices where legislation requires it such as the Community Vision, 4 Year Council Plan, Financial Plan, Asset Plan and when it is suitable to the scope, complexity and impact of the project or decision.

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Among the key features of deliberative engagement is that it must be:

- Representative in the sense that it involves a representative cross-section of the community, usually selected at random – with the aim of maximizing inclusion
- **Deliberative:** allowing for extended consideration of a key question; and
- **Influential:** Participants will be informed of the level of influence the community engagement process will have on Council decision-making.

Council value and recognise the contribution of participants who have given up their time to provide feedback or attend engagement activities, therefore our community will be informed by providing progress updates of engagement processes underway.

Hearing of submissions

Submissions received under section 223 of the *Local Government Act 1989* until its repeal or received through a community engagement process undertaken by Council are made available for public inspection and may be published in Council business papers.

The Planning and Consultation Committee is a delegated committee, appointed to consider matters under two areas - planning and consultation.

Protection of privacy in community engagement

Council will provide notice on the collection, use and disclosure of personal information provided within a submission. Any data collected during the engagement process will be stored in a way that maintains privacy and meets the requirements of Information Privacy Principle 1 contained within the Privacy and Data Protection Act 2014.

Evaluation and Review

The evaluation activities will allow Council to meet its commitment to best practice community engagement by responding to evolving needs and expectations.

Evaluating and reviewing our engagement allows us to be both transparent and accountable. Feedback from our community provides clear data and evidence. It is also an important tool used by our Councillors to help inform their decision-making in matters before the Council.

The Community Engagement Guidelines will provide guidance and transparent criteria for Evaluation and Review.

Reporting to the community and Council on the outcomes of community engagement

Reporting back to our community

Council will keep in touch with our community during our engagement processes and report back. We will do this by:

- Reaching out to participants of the engagement process at the end to advise them of the outcome.
- Outlining how their participation influenced decision making.
- Where appropriate, providing participants with a short evaluation of our process so that we can improve our process for next time.
- Using different communication channels depending on who we are engaging, including the Participate Nillumbik website and our print publications.
- Taking into consideration people with a disability and people with no access to social media or the internet.

Reporting back to Council

When reporting to Council on the outcomes of a community engagement process, Council will:

- Provide any key data, evidence, or reports about community engagement, including reports provided by consultants.
- Explain the purpose and scope of the community engagement that has been implemented.
- Outline the engagement methods used, the details of who participated, an overview of findings, and any recommendations.
- Provide reasons and evidence if the Council officer recommendation is contrary to the views of our community and stakeholders. The reasons for this should be explained in the Council report drawing on evidence as appropriate.
- Provide reasons for our decision making in reports to Council if a Council officer has made a decision that impacts the community under delegation.

Relationship to Council Plan

Genuine community engagement is essential to delivering on the aspirations of our residents and is one fundamental way Council gains insight to support informed decision making.

Council will continue to provide updates that show how community engagement has been considered in decision making, to ensure engagement processes remain transparent and meaningful.

Council's key strategic objectives:

- 1. Inclusive living and participation
- 2. Liveable and connected communities
- 3. Sustainable futures and healthy environments
- 4. Responsible governance and community leadership.



Resources and tools to support our Community Engagement Framework

Independent research

Community satisfaction and preferred methods of engagement are captured in independent research. This is based on a randomly selected sample of citizens and delivers statistically reliable results that can be compared across years and in some years across Councils.

Each year Council engages a consultancy company to undertake the Annual Community Satisfaction Survey as Council wants to know what our community thinks about a range of areas including Council's overall performance, Council's services and facilities, Planning and Housing development, Communication methods and more.

The survey assists in providing insight into how we can provide improved and effective services and facilities to our community.

The survey also assists Council in meeting annual and mandated State Government performance reporting requirements by measuring community satisfaction in a number of areas covered by the survey. We are able to compare our customer satisfaction ratings and benchmark our performance from year to year.

To encourage and invite our community and stakeholders to participate in community engagement activities, we may promote the opportunities in a range of different ways.



Project Background

Following the adoption of Council's first Community Engagement Policy in 2021, a review was undertaken to ensure the policy continues to reflect community expectations and best practice engagement.

Community feedback was gathered from 1- 30 September 2025 through online surveys, face-to-face conversations and community events to help test the effectiveness of Council's Community Engagement Policy. Participants represented a broad cross-section of the community, including young adults, families, older residents, and people from cultural and linguistically diverse backgrounds. A total of 103 voices were heard during the engagement period.

How we engaged

Throughout the consultation period, we engaged the community and encouraged participation through a variety of ways.

- the Participate Nillumbik website which provided key information about the project and hosted an online survey
- social media (Facebook/Instagram),
- Council officers roamed the Hurstbridge Wattle Festival, Diamond Creek Rotary Festival, Edendale Community Environment Farm
- Attended the Positive Ageing Advisory Committee
- · held two internal staff meetings.

Over 100 people engaged with the project information and resources provided. The following images and table highlight the promotional material and engagement tools that we used to inform the community about the project and promote their participation in the engagement approach.

What we heard

We heard residents access Council information through a variety of channels:

- Nillumbik News remains a key and trusted source, particularly among residents aged 40 and over.
- The Council website and e-newsletters are frequently used by residents in their 30s to 50s.
- Social media, especially Facebook groups like Eltham 3095, plays an important role in keeping people informed and connected.
- Word of mouth and personal networks are strong information sources for younger residents in their early 20s.
- Many older residents still prefer printed materials and phone contact, valuing the ability to speak directly with Council staff.

Question 1: What are your thoughts on our draft Community Engagement Policy 2025? Are there any areas you would change and why?

From my experience on NSC's advisory committees I suggest more notice should be taken of their advice/recommendations as currently only there as a sounding board for staff. For PAAC, it has taken13 months before a unanimous recommendation got to a Council meeting, then in confidence and a negative report.

Great that Council is aiming to be more inclusive.

The needs to be clear consultation across all sources for everything. Consultation seems too haphazard. Sometimes it is in a newsletter. Sometimes it is in an email. Sometimes it is via Facebook. When council want to seek the opinion of its rate payers it should approach them across all forms especially as the older demographic are not much online.

We need a true all ages community space such as a proper fully functioning library. A space where students can study, a space where mums can meet, a space with school holidays activities, a space where older people can host meeting groups, a space where we can borrow from an extensive library rather than driving 20-30 mins from the Hurstbridge area to get to Eltham/Greensborough/mill Park. Prior community spaces have been heavily sport focussed for example DC netball courts however this only accounts for a small population, often empty throughout the week. A space that can be accessed by all, any day of the week would be an ideal use of community funds.

Overall I think it is excellent, but there may be need for some improvements in the future when/if problems are identified



Engagement preferences varied across age groups and life stages:

- Younger residents (20s–30s) are comfortable providing quick feedback online but prefer speaking to someone directly for more complex or personal matters.
- Families and working-age adults (30s–50s) engage online for convenience but appreciate opportunities for in-person discussions on issues that directly affect them, such as roads, traffic and parks.
- Older residents (60+) prefer face-to-face or phone-based engagement and continue to rely on mail and *Nillumbik News* for information.
- In-person engagement remains valued for serious or complex topics where residents want deeper discussion and accountability.

Question 3: Do you experience any barriers when providing feedback?



Most respondents reported no barriers to participation. However, some noted they rarely provided feedback to Council, believing it would not influence decisions while others commented that they didn't have enough time to participate.

Motivators for engagement

Residents are more likely to engage when they can see that their feedback leads to tangible outcomes. Some suggested offering small incentives, such as rate vouchers, to boost survey participation. Positive experiences, such as feeling heard on local issues or seeing improvements in community facilities will help build trust and encourage ongoing involvement.

Question 5: Do you have any thoughts on how we can improve our community consultation practices?

Just make sure you give regular updates of how you have used the feedback

The CEO should reply to his correspondence and so should Councillors. There should be a time frame of 48 hours for staff and Councillors to reply to phone and email communication.

Encourage First Peoples and Wurundjeri People to engage and participate in the consultation and let them know they are encouraged and invited to take part.

Too much time and money in my opinion is wasted on in person talk fests. Ask me a question online or in print and I will have my say.

Listen. Act in accordance to resident requests stop wasting money.

I have noticed an improvement in Council notifying local community via signage . Reintroduction of Council noticeboards at post-office.

The placement of signs where works are are to take place and why is great for those not on social media or emails .

A regular Ward report via that wards social media sites for those that use them .

Focus could be made in more informal settings. i do feel the relationship i have with the council is quite formal and for people this could be quite overwhelming. i think also approaching already established informal groups and asking them is very important in receiving a diverse range of feedback

No, perhaps communication, e.g. emails, newsletters could be more visible

Internal Staff Sessions - Key insights

Staff emphasised the importance of targeting relevant and harder-to-reach groups, with opportunities to co-design and make engagement more genuine and meaningful. Participants highlighted the need to challenge existing approaches, review budgets and ensure feedback is acknowledged and acted upon.

Timing and planning were identified as critical, including the need to "close the loop" with communities and avoid long gaps between consultations. Staff also raised questions about budget allocation for weekend or after-hours engagement to improve accessibility.

There was strong agreement on the need to evaluate engagement effectiveness, set benchmarks at the outset, and ensure good reach and representation.

Staff noted the importance of capturing children's voices through age-appropriate methods such as drawing activities, and being transparent with the community about the level of engagement using the IAP2 spectrum.

Constraints such as tight timeframes, funding dependencies and project uncertainty were acknowledged as challenges.

What's working well:

- in-person engagement and direct interaction
- targeted engagement with impacted groups
- · cross-collaboration with community groups and consultants
- providing translation services
- being mindful of event timing and community calendars.

Staff highlighted uncertainty around when consultation is required, particularly for smaller-scale projects such as community events or awards. There was a clear need to clarify internal processes and define triggers for community consultation, ensuring a consistent approach across teams.

Questions were raised about the role and influence of Councillors in community consultation, including how their involvement is defined and whether this is outlined in the Councillor Code of Conduct.

Findings

Overall, community sentiment towards the draft *Community Engagement Policy* 2025 was positive, with respondents generally supportive of Council's direction and efforts to make engagement more inclusive and accessible.

Several respondents appreciated online participation options, noting that digital tools suit busy lifestyles and allow for flexible, accessible feedback. However, many emphasised the importance of maintaining a mix of engagement methods — including in-person sessions, printed materials and direct contact with Councillors — to ensure all community members can participate.

Some participants expressed frustration about whether community feedback influences Council decisions, suggesting a need for clearer communication on how input is used. Others called for more consistent updates, faster response times from staff and Councillors, and greater visibility of consultation outcomes.

A few respondents highlighted opportunities to strengthen relationships through more informal, approachable engagement, and to better involve underrepresented groups such as First Nations people and younger residents.

These findings suggest that the updates made in the draft Community Engagement Policy 2021 have been reflected accurately and that the need for stronger follow-through, transparency and variety in engagement approaches resonates with our community.
